All of this information can be found in real time.

What you'll also learn by examining LMI, is that there are good jobs in many industry sectors in each of the Atlantic provinces, some of which you may have not heard of before. And as times change, these jobs will change and new job opportunities will come about. The world is evolving and it is essential that you be ready for this change by understanding how your skills can be transferable - it is challenging to predict the exact skills that may be needed in the workforce in 10 years time, which means that above all, being adaptable and resilient is extremely important to prepare you for changes that lay ahead.

While LMI can be found on government sites, you also need to think about the types of conversations you can have with career influencers in your lives - your teachers and school counsellors, family members, employment centre and postsecondary career advisors, industry recruiters, mentors in your community and more - with their input and advice, you can determine which information is relevant for you and what you need to help you plan your career path.

- A single source of Labour Market Information should be used with caution; look at different resources and sources that can support you in exploring your options.
- Take advantage of experience and expertise in your own backyards don't be afraid to ask questions to find the answers you really need to support you. This is an ideal opportunity for you to develop your networking skills!
