ADVOCACY COMMITTEE

This year, the Board of Directors created an Advocacy Committee, as part of our strategic plan to broaden the work of the Mission. The Committee is tasked with creating a plan that will help us move beyond the charity model to address the issues of poverty, to foster lifting people out of poverty and creating positive community social change.

The Committee has spent the year gaining knowledge about the challenges faced by community members. We are inspired by those we have met, and we know that Brunswick Street Mission offers much needed supports. But despite these supports, we continue to see an increase in the number of individuals and families seeking help.

What voice should Brunswick Street Mission have when it comes to poverty? Meeting with community partners the Committee began to focus on two questions: What is meant by advocacy and, what should we focus on?

We know there is an immediate need for programming and supports and it is time for Brunswick Street Mission to get involved, to become more than just a stop gap for poverty in the Halifax Regional Municipality. Poverty is expensive when you consider the cost of health care, the criminal justice system, the loss of tax revenue and the cost of running charities that support people living in poverty. Dealing with issues such as the devastating impact of mental health, dental health, addiction and inadequate housing; not to mention the need for harm reduction programs and safe injection sites are topics we will delve into further. Armed with the knowledge gained over the past year, we look forward to creating a plan that will see us have a real voice in the poverty conversation.

OUR PROGRAMS

Brunswick Street Mission serves people who struggle with poverty. Many are homeless, others are at risk of homelessness. There are individuals, couples, and families with children. Some work, some are on assistance and others are on disability or pension support.

Their backgrounds are as varied as they are, but the one thing they all have in common is the daily struggle they face, and a future that does not seem to hold much promise or joy.

Breakfast Program

It is important for people start each day with a nutritious meal. In addition to offering companionship and a place to rest, Brunswick Street Mission offers a hot meal to anyone in need six days a week.

Monday through Friday, our Breakfast Coordinator works with volunteers to ensure all our guests are fed.

Saturday morning breakfasts are sponsored by wonderful volunteer groups who not only donate their time to prepare and serve the meal, but also donate the food that feeds our guests.

66 Saturday and Holiday breakfasts were served by volunteer groups. Companies, churches, family & friends coming together so people can start the day with a full stomach and a smile.

Clothing Bank

It is easy to forget your own needs when you are forced to choose between providing clothing for yourself and your children and paying rent, utilities or other expenses. Thanks to our generous donors, Brunswick Street Mission's Clothing Bank can offer gently used clothing and small household items to anyone in need.

Run by volunteers, the Clothing Bank is open every Monday (except holidays) and accessible by anyone in need.

Food Bank

Many of the individuals and families who access our Food Bank rely on income or disability assistance and have no choice but to use food banks regularly to get by.

Each Thursday, our Food Bank is able to offer families and individuals in need a small level of food security by offering fresh food and canned items.

Thank you to Feed Nova Scotia for providing food to Brunswick Street Mission as well as the other 141 food banks in Nova Scotia.

Benevolent Support

Poverty is often chronic, creating a tremendous amount of pressure when you come up short on an already tight budget.

Often, a relatively small amount of assistance can help avert a crisis or help bring stability to an individual's life. That is Benevolent Support.

Our dedicated volunteer coordinator supports people with issues from one-time sizeable bills, such as utilities or rent, to employment related expenses such as work boots, and from registration fees to expenses to support leaving a violent or abusive situation.

Tax Return Program

Brunswick Street Mission knows that people living in poverty struggle to keep up-to-date records, so when someone walks through our doors looking to get their taxes completed, we can help. In fact, we can go back as far as 10 years in some cases.

Thanks to knowledgable volunteers, we are able to ensure people qualify for government rebates and tax credits, while still maintaining their Income Assistance.

Trusteeship Program

Sometimes all someone needs is some on-going support to get things organized and set up. The Trusteeship program provides financial management for individuals who have a history of struggling to maintain their limited income.

This type of financial management allows our Trustee to accept income cheques, pay bills (rent, power) and send the remaining portion for other living expenses to the individual.

"I was facing a rent increase & eviction before working with a Trustee. Income assistance wouldn't cover my expenses & it was a rough few months but with my Trustee I worked hard & was able to stay in my apartment and have the necessities that I lacked before."

Christmas Program

The Christmas Program allows us to offer some joy during a season that can be stressful for families and individuals living in poverty.

The Christmas Program includes a "shop" offering gifts to the entire family, food hampers providing a full "turkey" meal with all the trimmings, Christmas Eve Luncheon and 11th Hour Support. All these parts work together to ensure that everyone has an opportunity to celebrate and be festive.

11th Hour Support is there for families who have fallen through the gaps. Each year hundreds of families miss out on items like food hampers and gifts. This last minute program, in partnership with Feed Nova Scotia, ensures that there is hope for those families.

OUR VOLUNTEERS

Volunteers are an invaluable resource to charities.

Volunteers improve and run programming at Brunswick Street Mission by filling positions that would otherwise remain empty due to costs.

Volunteers make a meaningful contribution; running our front desk, food bank, clothing bank and benevolent program as well as supporting our breakfast and Christmas programs.

Volunteers connect with, talk to and support each and every person who walks through our doors looking for help.

In 2019 volunteer contributed over 7,600 hours or the equivalent in operational savings of \$205,250*.

"We can estimate the value of volunteer work by multiplying the total number of volunteer hours in any given year by the value of work, measured as the average hourly wage in the core non-profit sector. In 2017, this wage was \$27.0 per hour, roughly 76 per cent of the economy-wide average wage of \$35.5 per hour.

A FUNDRAISER'S STORY

Bell Aliant Supports Brunswick Street Mission

This is just one of the stories about a business making the decision to support the work of Brunswick Street Mission:

The Nova Scotia-based IT team of Bell Aliant learned that the Brunswick Street Mission had a specific, immediate need for the people that it serves - new underwear.

In early 2019, Bell Aliant raised \$1,420 to purchase these items. After partnering with Stanfield's Ltd., who generously offered the items at a significant discount, and matched the Bell Aliant purchase **650** pairs of NEW Stanfield's quality men's underwear which were delivered and distributed through our Clothing Bank.

"People are grateful for used clothing but no one should have to wear used underpants."

But it didn't end there . . .

Bell Aliant spent the summer collecting supplies for our guests animals. Over **200** bags of food, the equivalent of over 2 tons, was collected as well as treats, blankets, beds, towels, leashes, collars, harnesses and bowls for dogs and cats. These items were shared through both our Food Bank and Clothing Bank.

The BUTTS and PUPS fundraiser was amazing enough but they were also able to raise **\$1,000** through their company's volunteer matching program.

Oh - did we mention they also purchase food and cook breakfast for the Breakfast Program at least twice a year?
