

Providing Meals to Halifax Sheathers During COVID-19

Last week Brunswick Street Mission began to provide 55 breakfast, lunch and supper to Metro Turning Point, or 165 meals daily. By Tuesday (March 24th), we will be preparing and delivering over 200 meals to local shelters, and we expect that number to continued to climb. Our professional kitchen is run by 3 lead cooks along with a small group of volunteers.

Personal distancing is so important but we need more volunteers, healthy people who can give a couple days a week to help us prepare the food and delivery it to the shelters.

We also need a lot more food. Feed Nova Scotia is supportive of our plan but it won't be enough. "We need you to make a financial donation to help us purchase the food we need to cook over 350 meals daily", says Executive Director Sandra Nicholas.
