

Research Links from Around the World

Each month, News You Can Use will highlight several examples of new and interesting research taking place at universities around the world.



This month, rather than highlight specific research projects, we thought you might find it interesting to have a few stats on the U15 Group of Canadian Research Universities. The U15 represents 15 of Canada's top research universities, including Dalhousie University. Together, U15 universities:

- undertake 80 per cent of all competitive university research in Canada;
- conduct \$8.5 billion of research annually;
- contribute more than \$36 billion to the Canadian economy

each year;

- produce more than 75 per cent of all doctorates awarded in Canada;
- receive 79 per cent of all competitively allocated research funding in Canada; and
- hold 85 per cent of Canadian university technology licences and 81 percent of Canadian university patents.
