President's Message

Welcome to 2019! I hope you enjoyed some time away from work over the December break.

We have a number of priorities for the coming term, chief amongst them being preparing for the 2020 round of collective bargaining. Expect to be hearing from us



You will no doubt have noticed that the Budget Advisory Committee (BAC) has issued a document on the Context for the 2019-2020 University Budget, and discussion forums will take place very soon. Online surveys are also available. Perhaps needless to say, the DFA strongly encourages all members to take advantage of these opportunities to express your concerns around University budgeting practices and the impact of chronic cuts to unit budgets on your work and the quality of Dalhousie's Academic Mission. The DFA has struck a University Budget task force to prepare a submission to the BAC and to our new Vice-President Academic and Provost Dr. Teri Balser, which we will circulate widely.

Through the DFA Equity Committee we are gathering information on two matters related to Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion, first in relation to the use of Student Ratings of Instruction to evaluate teaching performance, and second in relation to how Affirmative Action policies are being implemented during searches and appointments. We are aware of several issues and concerns in both of these areas, and we will be issuing briefs on both topics as this work unfolds. If you have encountered issues in either of these areas we encourage you to reach out to us at dfa@dal.ca.

Each year around this time we look to recruit individuals to various roles and positions within the DFA, and with collective bargaining rapidly approaching there will be lots of opportunities to get involved. If you would like to learn more about the ways that you can contribute to the Association I would be more than happy to discuss with you in person or by email.

If you follow the local news you will have probably heard that our colleagues at Mount Saint Vincent University have ratified a new Collective Agreement following very long and difficult negotiations which required conciliation and a strong strike mandate from members. Our colleagues at Saint Mary's University have not reached agreement on a new contract, and are within days of a possible strike after conciliation failed earlier this month. As always I encourage to you reach out to colleagues to show your support, and if a strike is necessary to achieve a fair deal then I can assure you that the DFA will stand and march in solidarity.
