Revisiting a Successful 40th Anniversary Production



e celebrated our 40th anniversary in style. Let's take a look back on the 2018 Royal Nova Scotia International Tattoo...



We kicked things off with a ceilidh - we're in Nova Scotia after all! After stepping back in time to see how a 'tattoo' began, the 40th anniversary Tattoo was officially opened.

We were lucky to be joined by friends from every corner of the globe. Australia, Brazil,

Germany, Jordan, Kenya, Russia, Singapore, the UK and the United States were all on hand for the first truly international Tattoo!

The Langley Ukulele Ensemble brought the jukebox tunes; Cores da Bahia brought the circus; the Simba Zambezi Acrobats



brought the fire; Team AIRTIME brought the extreme stunts... and that's not even mentioning the Russian folk dancing (The State Academic Ensemble of Folk Dance of Adygea)!



We also had military and police bands (the German Air Force Band Münster, The Combined Singapore Police Force Band, and the 2d Marine Division Band), the swords and drill teams from Jordan (The Royal Circassian Honour Guard and The Silent Drill Team of the Royal Honour Guard). Plus, a fiddler, a penguin, the flamenco team, the gymnasts, the drummers, the Halifax Regional Police, Halifax Regional Fire & Emergency, and the many, many Canadian Armed Forces bands, Pipes & Drums units, and Highland Dancers.



With the support of the Canadian Armed Forces, we highlighted the vital role they play in peacekeeping and stability, both at home and abroad. The Mighty Maroon Machine (5th Canadian Division) featured in Act I, showcasing their



team and their work. See more on page 22.

Stadacona Band of the Royal Canadian Navy, the National Band of the Naval Reserve, the Royal Canadian Artillery Band, and the Canadian Army Military Band all performed with the Massed Bands; and 12 Wing Shearwater, 14 Wing Greenwood, 2nd Battalion Royal Canadian Regiment, 5th Canadian Division



Support Group all performed with the Massed Pipes & Drums. The Canadian Cadets, the Black Watch Association, the Nova Scotia Tattoo Youth Pipes & Drums, the Women Police Pipes & Drums and The Gurkha Contingent Pipes & Drums Platoon, rounded out the Massed Pipes & Drums.



For the first time, youngsters from the Nova Scotia Tattoo

Youth Pipes & Drums performed in the Tattoo. This program operates in Halifax, Sydney, the Valley and Chester, and offers free bagpiping and Highland drumming lessons to interested students. You can read more about their experiences on page 24.

We commemorated the centenary of the end of the First World War with a poignant tribute to those who served and sacrificed;

we paid tribute to the Battle of the Atlantic, the longest military campaign of the Second World War; and honoured Women in Service, from the front lines to the



Home front, and throughout Canadian history.

We were thrilled to welcome Her Excellency the Right Honourable Julie Payette, Governor General of Canada, to the opening show on June 27th. This was the first time we've ever had a Governor General in attendance, and it was especially poignant to have a trail-blazing woman like Her Excellency attend our anniversary show!

They also visited New Minas and made several appearances in Halifax throughout Tattoo Week!

Speaking of the Tattoo Festival – it was jam-packed with great performances around Halifax, including The Silent Drill Team of the Royal Honour Guard with a mini-parade on Argyle Street; Team AIRTIME jumping over their Liaison Officer at Sobeys Penhorn; Harry Knight, the 10-year-old flamenco guitarist from



Calgary, playing at the Seaport Market; and the German Air Force Band Münster performing at



St. John's Anglican Church in Lunenburg.

We had a great year, and we hope that everyone who came to see our 40th anniversary show had a great time as well.

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The Royal Nova Scotia International Tattoo was proud to welcome Her Excellency the Right Honourable Julie Payette, Governor General of Canada, to open and attend the 2018 Tattoo.

Madam Payette attended the June 27th performance, alongside the Lieutenant Governor and the Premier of Nova Scotia, and gave a short speech before officially opening the show.

Speaking about the Tattoo's motto to "stir the heart and call you home," Madam Payette said, "I've been in this province for two days now, and I feel home."

This was the first time a Governor General has attended the Tattoo in its 40-year history, and it was especially poignant to have a trailblazing woman like Madam Payette open the Tattoo, which included a major theme of Women in Service that recognized trailblazers throughout Canadian history.

Madam Payette paid her first official visit to Nova Scotia on June 26th

Canada's Army in Atlantic Canada. presented an incredible rappelling demonstration this year that paired dynamic movement with realistic sound and visuals to keep the audience on its toes while CAF members from all elements supported the Battle of the Atlantic memorial scene.
