

Shaded areas indicate CSANE members


APSEA throughout the province





# Constitutional Framework of the Nova Scotia Teachers Union

### Structure Details

#### I Provincial Executive

The Provincial Executive is elected from across the province to represent NSTU members. They meet monthly and direct the business of the Union between Councils. A list of Provincial Executive members can be found in the Member Diary.

#### **II** Local Executive

This executive is made up of members elected from the Local. The Local Executive is a committee of the Provincial Executive and conducts the business of the local.

#### III NSTU Reps in Local

Each school / campus has one or more union representative. Reps provide the essential connection between the provincial body, the Local, and the individual member.

#### IV Regional Representative Council (RRC)

The RRC represents the bargaining unit and deals directly with the Regional Centres for Education in the public school system. CSANE does not have an RRC.
