

FINANCIAL OUTLOOK - DOLLARS AND SENSE



Although a budget isn't considered by everyone to be a spiritual topic for a newsletter, it's an important topic to talk about, and every church faces a time when difficult conversations must be had with its congregants and families, just as we share positive news we must also be transparent about our financial outlook with the congregation.

Every year, the A&M committee, in conjunction with all other committees and Council, and under the assistance of our Woodlawn Accountant, Ivan Richardson, works to develop a budget, to set financial goals that allow us to continue with and design new programs, stretching our collective faith to determine what we want our church to be and do.

At the past council meeting, we reviewed the year end financial status, measuring where we are against the forecast, and noted that due to many increases in expenses, especially things out of our control such as the climbing cost of natural gas, cleaning, maintenance, loss of rental revenue due to Covid, etc., that it would be necessary to carry out a number of fundraising efforts which proceeds would be applied against the increased deficit. It's our hope that by offering unique fundraisers during and after worship they will elicit a positive response for supporting the church, its mission and ministry.

We ask you to continue to watch for details that will be shared soon.

GOVERNANCE REVIEW UPDATE

Through the spring and early summer months, the Transition team completed the task of interviewing all of the existing committees and Council of Woodlawn as well as staff. Committees were interviewed after given advance notice by the Transition Team that we would be reviewing with them the description of their role and responsibilities according to the current governance model. They were asked to consider what gave them energy? What was draining? What were they doing? What has changed?

This exercise bore much fruit in terms of creating a governance document that more accurately reflects who Woodlawn is as opposed to who Woodlawn used to be or what some may "think" Woodlawn is. It should be noted that the Transition team discovered committees that were populated with many passionate, responsible and faithful individuals with a heart for the church. For the most part, these committees that make up much of the operational activity of Woodlawn were quite functional, even when their work no longer reflected what they used to do as needs evolved and changed.

The next step is to present a new governance document that is a better representation of who does what, when and how. It is also hoped the suggested changes bring some clarity to roles and responsibilities around decision making. The governance document will be presented to the congregation by the Transition Team once it has been reviewed by Region 15. It is hoped such a review will be complete by mid-October.

DEALING WITH THE PINCH

Have you ever felt "the pinch"? One of those times in life when things aren't going the way you planned or expected? Usually "the pinch" is felt because one lacks the resources or the means to do what they used to do, or what they want to do, or maybe what they used to do. When someone or an organization feels "the pinch" it usually comes with a level of disruption. It can even lead to unintentional conflict. The disruption comes about because even though people are feeling "the pinch," chances are they will avoid talking about it or seeking to find a way to resolve it. Instead people will look to blame and create excused which can lead to the undoing of relationships, even longstanding ones.

It is not unusual for any of us to feel "the pinch." It is also not unusual for businesses, or organizations or communities like churches to experience it either. Without a doubt Woodlawn United Church has experienced "the pinch" in the past. Like many churches presently dealing with the disruptive nature of the pandemic combined with declining membership and an aging congregation, Woodlawn is feeling "the pinch" again. It's time to talk about "the pinch" and hopefully find ways to deal with it so it does not become as disruptive to the ministry of Woodlawn as it potentially could be.

As the Transition Teams completes its work the hope is that Woodlawn will be in a position to call ministry personnel into a pastoral relationship (current ministry personnel at Woodlawn are on appointment and not "called"). What this ministry personnel complement in the life and work of Woodlawn will look like moving forward is dependent on the resources that are available. It would not be prudent to call someone into a pastoral relationship if the financial and organization realities are such that the congregation and ministry personnel feel the pressure of "the pinch" shortly thereafter. Dealing with the disruption of "the pinch" will detract from the more meaningful work of ministry.

In order to help the Transition Team better understand where Woodlawn is at and as we seek to understand what's possible in terms of meeting the personnel needs of Woodlawn please consider the following:

1. To further the life and ministry of Woodlawn United Church Is there a place I can serve in a volunteer capacity and use my gifts?

There are many excellent groups and committees at Woodlawn, with a few people doing yeoman's work on behalf of the whole and we are so appreciative of the ways people contribute and support our collective ministry through the sharing of time and talents. One area where we are experiencing "the pinch" is with the Ministry and Personnel Committee. The M&P Committee is the one committee that needs to be

functioning for the wellbeing of a pastoral relationship and is required by United Church of Canada policy. Woodlawn needs a few individuals with good people and administrative acumen who can serve in this capacity. If this is something you can help with, please speak with Rev. Skinner.

2. To support the ministry and staffing needs of Woodlawn United Church, what increase can I make to my annual financial gift?

When it comes to money, we can all feel "the pinch" and Woodlawn is no exception. In the current year 2022, Woodlawn budgeted a deficit of \$40 000. Such an operating deficit makes it impossible to sustain our current level of paid staff. Over the next few weeks consider the level of financial support you give to the life and work of Woodlawn. If you can increase your gift or would like to increase the amount you give by PAR, please let our finance team know via the Church Office. Your gifts and ongoing financial support are important for budgeting purposes and planning. Thank you for your generosity and investment in the ministry of Woodlawn United.

Stovetop Hot Cocoa – Fall's Perfect Beverage (submitted by Shelley Clee)

Ingredients

- 4 Cups Whole Milk
- 1/4 Cup Cocoa Powder
- 1/2 Cup Granulated Sugar
- 1/2 Cup Semi-Sweet Chocolate Chips
- Pinch of Salt
- Splash of Vanilla or Caramel Extract



Instructions

- 1. Heat 1 cup of milk in a large saucepan over medium-high heat just until very warm (not boiling). In a small bowl whisk together the cocoa powder, granulated sugar, and salt. Add the cocoa powder and sugar mixture to the milk. Whisk until smooth and all of the lumps are removed.
- 2. Add the remaining milk and whisk even more. Heat the hot chocolate mixture until very warm, but do not boil.
- 3. Remove the hot chocolate from the heat and add semi-sweet morsels. Mix until the chocolate is melted. Add vanilla if desired.
- 4. Pour the hot cocoa into your favorite mugs and enjoy! Top with whatever toppings you like most or nothing at all.

GRATEFUL IS MORE THAN A FEELING (submitted by Rev. Dale)

At about 5:00AM on September 24, as the post-tropical storm Fiona was still unleashing its fury upon all of us, I wouldn't say "grateful" was the first word that came to mind when Maryann and I got out of bed and our feet hit four inches of water on our basement floor (we had slept in the basement to escape some of the noise from the extreme wind and rain and attempt to get some sleep). Gratitude definitely wasn't the word that came to mind as I looked outside and saw the violent waters of the storm surge. Gratitude also wasn't a word that came to mind as we slowly went around after the winds subsided to check on our neighbours and surveyed the devastation that was all around us. Yes we were glad we were okay and that our neighbours were okay but I wasn't necessarily "feeling" grateful. I know there are many in the wake of the storm and in the wake of any of life's storms who would agree.

I must say that witnessing the destruction caused by Fiona not far from our Thanksgiving holiday got me thinking about how we use words like gratitude and grateful and thanksgiving. These can be healing, heart-warming words to be sure, and to feel them rolling off one's lips certainly feels noble and lofty, but here's the thing: If we allow them to remain just words – if we don't take the responsibility for transforming them from words into action – we've effectively rendered them

inert. I believe we also reject the transforming presence of God in our hearts. I think of a prophetic verse in the Bible uttered by the prophets Ezekiel and Isaiah and also by Jesus, "These people honour me with their lips but not with their hearts." (Ez.33:31; Is.29:13; Mt.15:8).

By this I mean this: I can write about the goodness and glory of gratitude, but unless I get up from my keyboard, walk away from my desk and push myself straight out into the world to purposefully practice gratitude, express gratitude and breathe gratitude then I'm giving my own gratitude short shrift. Don't get me wrong: The writing of the words is fine – essential, even – but I also need to put my gratitude into motion.

I don't have the time or the luxury to render my gratitude inert. After what we've all been through, with a pandemic and a record breaking storm, the collective act of giving thanks must be bold and audacious. Loud and raucous and bright lest we get sucked into paranoia, resentment and despair. I must switch my gratitude on like a lamp so that other folks can feel its warmth and be illuminated by its light, and I need my brethren to do the same for me. Sure, I'll shine my light ... but I need your light, too. And don't just speak the words for me, I say it for others. Grateful is more than a feeling, its what we are called to be for one another.

You have likely been there. A million and one things to do: errands, housekeeping, food prep, work, volunteering. Sometimes we can be so busy checking off our to-do list that we forget to pause and appreciate all that God has blessed us with in life.

Enter Thanksgiving. A time to stop and catalogue what we are grateful for.
