## MY INTERNATIONAL SUMMER A STORY OF COMPASSION & FRIENDSHIP By Joan Mikkelsen





"I felt I had to do something ... "

Joan's story

Before I tell my story of hosting a woman from Ukraine, I first want to say I was overwhelmed with the support from friends, family, and especially my Woodlawn United Church family. You have been so caring, and so generous with your donation of items to help Tania (Tetiana) set up in her new apartment, which she is sharing with another Ukrainian woman who arrived in Canada a week before she did. Thank you so very much.

After seeing news coverage of the horrific events happening in Ukraine, I woke up one morning feeling very blessed to live in Canada and thought I just had to help. I thought about my paternal grandparents who received support when they immigrated to Canada from Denmark 110 years ago, and now it was my turn to help.

Ukrainians have been fleeing from their war- torn country and are arriving in Canada with what they can carry. It is unimaginable what some have witnessed and have been through. Along with the need to feel safe, when they arrive in their new country they have many basic needs that we take for granted. I sent my application to host to the Ukrainian Canadian Congress NS Branch. However, a Facebook friend who was hosting a Ukrainian woman (now Tania's roommate) suggested I join the Atlantic Canada hosts for Ukrainians Facebook group. I did, and as they say, the rest is history.

I joined the group late Monday night and immediately saw a post from Leanne of Bridgewater (who had been corresponding with a Ukrainian woman) looking for accommodations in Dartmouth on a bus route. Leanne set up a group chat and sent Tania a message that she would receive when she woke up on Tuesday morning. The three of us chatted virtually, and by that afternoon I had committed to be her host. She would be arriving the following week, and would be starting a job two weeks later.

To say it was quite different with someone in the house, after having the house to myself for several years, would be an understatement. However, things have gone amazingly well.

During Covid I had become the queen of hermits, so I experienced some culture shock getting back out into the world. The first week there were lots of things to do, such as getting a SIN number, MSI card, driver's license, bank account, bus pass, and medical exam, and putting a variety of other applications in order. And of course, just getting to know one another.

I dusted off my tourist director's hat, and we visited many beaches, Peggy's Cove, toured the south shore as far as Lunenburg, took the ferry to PEI and saw the Anne of Green Gables performance in Charlottetown, and attended the International Tattoo. We had a lot of fun. Hopefully we will see the fall colours around the Cabot Trail in October. Hosting has been a very rewarding experience. I am extremely glad I jumped out of my comfort zone and got involved. Tania is now a part of my family.

## Tania's Story

It took me 3 months to get to Nova Scotia, Canada and it was definitely worth it.

When the war began my parents and I recognized there is no safe place in Ukraine to live anymore. My mom insisted I leave Ukraine and start a new life abroad, and it was a difficult decision to make. I felt despair and powerlessness. Honestly, I didn't want to leave my country, family, friends and the life I had. But, unfortunately, the war made adjustments in every Ukrainian family.

I started my research of the countries I would like to live in. I was "exploring" Romania, Sweden and once I heard about the Canadian governmental program for Ukrainians (CUAET), I had no doubts Canada is the country I want to start my new life in. I applied for visa online and the next step was to proceed with my biometrics. Due to the war, all embassies and visa centers were closed across the country and the only way to complete my biometrics was to go to nearest European country. I made an online appointment and, in a week, I was in Poland.

It took three more weeks to be approved for the visa and two weeks to "stick" my visa in my passport. All that time, day and night I spent "online" investigating Canada provinces and programs. My first choice was Newfoundland and Labrador, because their representatives were promoting the province very actively in Poland. They provide support and free flights for Ukrainians. A week before the flight, I changed my mind. I had a feeling

that NL is not my place. There were 2 main reasons why I changed my decision and came to Nova Scotia – IKEA and the ocean, where you can swim in summer. Sounds silly, but I am so glad that I made a right choice.

During this time I was also looking for a job in Canada. I sent my CV and went through a couple of interviews. The other step I had to complete was to find a host family. I joined FB group Atlantic Hosts for Ukrainians and found a host family in Liverpool, NS. I had a few video calls with Leanne (a host), and was pretty sure I will go there. So, I bought a ticket on a flight and planned to arrive on June 14.

A week before the flight, I got a job in Dartmouth! I can't believe it happened! It was like a sign for me! I told Leanne about the "surprise" I received, and she made a post in FB group to see if we can find someone in Dartmouth, not far away from the work. And the next day, early morning I saw a message from Joan. It was just unbelievable, and I couldn't believe it happened with me again. It looked like God had some plans for me to come to Dartmouth and be hosted by Joan. I packed my 23 kg luggage and, in a week, I arrived in Halifax.

Since the day I arrived, I feel safe, happy and blessed, thanks to Joan and all Canadians. It could not be "better match" than me and Joan. Now I call her my "Canadian grandma". Joan shared with me not only her house, but also her kindness and love. She took me on trip around NS, and I fell in love with nature and people. We went to PEI, explored beaches around Dartmouth, and had a great time watching evening news. She became a part of my family, and I hope one day she could visit Ukraine, and my home town.

I want to thank all the people who helped me to settle in my new home, especially Woodlawn United Church community. I got so much support and help from you! I am writing this letter the night before I move to my apartment, and this couldn't be possible without your help! There are no words which can describe how thankful I am to Joan and all people who helped me on my way. My new life is just beginning...

## **HOPE HAPPENS HERE**

I believe we all love to have things in our lives that we can look forward to. Maybe a special anniversary, vacation, milestone and so on. Looking forward to such things gives us hope in the future. This can be especially important in an age when we feel we have less and less to look forward to. We see this all around us as people lose confidence in the future and exchange hope for things like anxiety and fear. To me, this outlook is the opposite of faith. I think of the

words of the prophet Jeremiah, "For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." (Jer.29:11) or Jesus' many words of assurance to his disciples. One of the gifts of faith is hope. Hope has everything to do with the future.

As a part of the Church in our age, it can be difficult to believe in this hope. We look at the world around us and fear the worst when it comes to things like sickness, the economy and climate change. Then as we look inward at things like declining membership, financial uncertainty and organizational challenges we can wonder what exactly we have to look forward to? I do not have the answer to that question. That answer belongs to God and rests in an unknown future. I do know however that finding the road of faithfulness has a lot to do with getting to the future and having hope. Not just hope for ourselves but hope for others.

This past summer I participated in some small group sessions with some church leaders from the United States and Canada. These were times spent in reflection and conversation as we considered some of the aspects of what it takes to look forward as a church. What are some of the practices that keep us on the road of faithfulness? Three areas we focused on during our time together that morning were the areas of listening, hospitality and stewardship.

Listening is an essential spiritual practice. Listening is at the heart of effective communication and decision making. It is through listening that we create dialogue and build deeper relationships. Listening, that for us as a people of faith, begins with listening for God's voice in the midst of it all that we might hear again of God's plans to give hope and a future. The listening that for us happens when we seek to be present with others and acknowledge their presence and the life and community we share with one another. The kind of listening we engage in at meetings and gatherings, even when sharing a conversation over coffee after a Sunday morning service.

Hospitality is also a spiritual practice that is at the heart of our common life and the way of faithfulness. A hospitality that not only offers a warm hello to a newcomer, but a hospitality that seeks a relationship so that strangers become friends. It is the kind of hospitality and welcome that

makes others feel as if we want them to be a part of what we do and share our life as a community of faith. Hospitality that may include things like signage that clearly states who we are, what we do and when we do it. Hospitality that is constantly seeking to make those around us feel welcome and wanted, whether they be new or longstanding members and adherents. Hospitality that seeks to engage different ages, abilities and needs. Hospitality that invites and informs and opens the door to deepening relationships. Not that we seek to please everyone, but that we seek to make hospitality a way of being. We include others in the same way Jesus sought to include and welcome the ones no one else wanted.

Stewardship as a subject is one that not many want to address in the life of the church. So often we see stewardship as "the money we give to the church." We see stewardship as that which we are called to give up. But in faithfulness, stewardship is about "how we use that which we have been given by God." As we considered stewardship we spent time considering how to address the importance of congregational giving as we recognize that the church has financial obligations and bills to pay. Yet we also understand that connected to stewardship is mission. We appreciate that the church has a mission. A mission that goes back to those first two topics of listening and hospitality. A mission that seeks to allow us to live faithfully and invite others to share in this mission that seeks to build Christ-like relationships. Thus stewardship is about using our gifts for mission. When we practice good stewardship, we should be able to point to the ministries we support and share as a congregation. To do this, many churches have begun to use what is called a "narrative budget" that complements an annual financial budget. Although it can include a balance sheet and dollars and cents, a narrative budget tells the story of how we use our gifts and resources. When we can tell the story and see the bigger picture of our ministry as a people of faith, we can begin to see the value in what we are and help others see this too. It's not about what we give up, it's about what we get to do by the grace of God.

As we move forward and transition as a church into the future, I encourage you to continue to discern ways you can make a difference through listening, hospitality and stewardship. It is through this kind of service and leadership that opens us to living out the hope God has for us and others that we may look forward together.



In a world where so many around us are searching for hope, may we of Woodlawn United Church be a people who declare through our actions and words that "hope happens here!"

**Ostomy Halifax** is a non-profit, volunteer organization dedicated to supporting all people with an ostomy and their families since 1973. The group holds monthly meetings (except during covid) where people living with an ostomy can meet, share stories, listen to speakers and offer support. It is the largest ostomy support group in Canada with over 200 members.

Some of our members have completed a nationally certified Visitor Training Program and visit people in hospital or at home to help them adjust to their "new normal". An ostomy is created usually after cancer, Crohns, Colitis, a traumatic accident or even a birth defect. Surgeons take a piece of healthy bowel and create a tube from either the bladder or the intestine to the abdomen. The person then voids their bowel or bladder through the tube into a pouch placed on their belly. (Bladder cancer is the fifth most common cancer in Canada)

Most ostomates live a full and healthy life and many have a better quality of life than before their surgery as they no longer experience the pain and restrictions of having to be constantly close to facilities. In addition to supporting ostomates and their families on a day-to-day basis, Ostomy Halifax also sends 8 to 10 children to ostomy camp each summer to help them make friends, build self confidence and learn that they are not alone.

## UNITED CHURCH MISSION AND SERVICE WWJD? Here's One of the Church's Best Answers



The question "What would Jesus do?" often shortened to the acronym "W.W.J.D." has graced wrist bands, T-shirts, and bumper stickers since the 1990s. And while it might sound like an overused cliché, it's a question that can lead our spirit and, by extension, our lives to profound transformation.

What did Jesus do? He crossed a lot of boundaries. In fact, when we think about the boundaries that separate people—things like money, gender, education, culture, religion, and class—Jesus crossed them all.

He struck up a conversation with a Samaritan woman in a culture where it wasn't socially acceptable for men and women, much less Jews and Samaritans, to speak to one another. He healed the bodies and souls of people suffering from a variety of diseases when it was sinful to have anything to do with them. He visited the homes of tax collectors and sex trade workers and advocated for the rights of widows, orphans, and those living in poverty. He not only valued children in a time when they were considered such drains on society that they were abandoned on roadsides, but he also told his followers that unless they were more like children they wouldn't enter the kingdom of heaven.

In the same way, our generosity through <u>Mission & Service</u> breaks down walls that divide and builds bridges that draw us together.

Your generosity supports organizations like hospitals, counselling centres, drop-in circles, and homeless shelters that are there when people need them most. Your gifts sustain education programs that teach farming skills, provide job training, and help remove obstacles so children can remain in school. # Emergency Preparedness for Older Adults



As heat warnings continue across Canada, let's not forget that seniors are often the most impacted by emergencies such as the ongoing heat waves, the wildfires that have forced entire communities out of their homes in Manitoba and Newfoundland, and the severe storms that recently rocked parts of Ontario and Quebec.

#### A Practical Guide to Help Plan, Respond and Recover

Emergency preparedness is essential to the health and

safety of our communities and especially their most senior members, so it's crucial for individuals and families, especially those with older adults, to be prepared before an emergency happens. In collaboration with the National Institute on Ageing (NIA) at Toronto Metropolitan University, the Canadian Red Cross has developed new resources to help seniors be prepared for an emergency.

Emergency Preparedness for Older Adults: A Practical Guide to Help Plan, Respond and Recover details how to assess older adults' medical, physical and cognitive needs that may affect their ability to respond to a disaster or an emergency. It also highlights the importance of identifying helpers and building a support network of family, friends, neighbours, care providers and health professionals who can assist during a disaster or emergency.

Older adults themselves should be empowered to reach out and connect with their peers, particularly those who are more vulnerable, supporting each other in anticipating and preparing for disasters. A list of items and documents to prepare in the case of evacuation, and what to do once the recovery process begins are outlined in the guide.
