Transitional Ministry Message

Looking For Authenticity by Rev. Dr. Dale Skinner

Earlier in August I came across an article on relevantmagazine.com titled "Being Authentic Is More Than Just Being Honest." It was written by Stephen McAlpin, a minister in his 20's serving in California. He begins his article with the following:

Of all the things the millennial generation wants out of church, authenticity may be the most important... However, the quest for meaning isn't without its challenges. Authenticity itself is hard to define and because of that—it's even harder to find in churches.

I believe McAlpin makes a good point, although I believe that it's not just millennials who are looking for authenticity. I believe there are people of all demographics who are looking for authenticity in this world -looking for what is real and true. This transitional time offers a chance for we of Woodlawn to see what is real and true about ourselves and hopefully become a more authentic church. A church where we can be true to others because we are true to ourselves. seek to be true before God and true to what we value both individually and as a community. It's about knowing who we are now and being so informed, work on the Transitional goals, be intentional in our decision making and the kinds of ministries and programs we find meaningful and important. It's the kind of work necessary to be an inside-out kind of church that offers the community around us an outward expression of our inward faith.

It's not always easy to name our authentic values. Sometimes we may name values we wish were true about ourselves, but those are often "aspirational values" and not "authentic" ones. It can take time to name those values that truly motivate our behaviour, inform our decision making and express who we truly are before others. They are the values revealed in the choices we make. Knowing our core values help us to establish our starting place and locate "who" we are and the "why" of our actions. As one expert I read puts it, "You really are who you really are" and this Transitional time offers us some time to discover who we really are as a church.

Earlier this summer as an important initial task of this transitional work, members of Woodlawn were asked by the Transition Team to name some personally held values that connect to the life of the church. The Transition Team also appreciates that discerning these values can take time, "that authenticity can be hard to define," and wants you to know there is still time to send in your list of three or four values either via email or in writing.

For those who would rather do this work as a part of a larger group, there will also be some online and in person group events that will also seek further input from our Woodlawn family beginning in September.

The Transition Team wishes to thank those individuals who have already completed the exercise that has allowed us to hear from you and share some of the values you hold. So far we have heard about values such as empathy, growth, community, compassion, outreach, justice, kindness and so on. As we hear from more of you, we expect there will be other values to add to the list. We also know that some values are connected. Values like compassion, empathy and kindness, or community and relationship, or justice and fairness. Hopefully as our list grows the Transition Team and Woodlawn United Church will be even better equipped to do the important work of this Transitional time.

ANIMAL POLICY

Did you know that Woodlawn United Church has an Animal Policy? Woodlawn United Church accepts that God created animals and they are an invaluable part of our created world. We acknowledge the importance of pets in the lives of many people. Woodlawn United is also required to adhere to health and safety standards regarding animals and the presence of food service, as well as recognizing that many are sensitive and/or allergic to pet fur, dander, etc., and that some people have fear of some animals which may prevent the enjoyment that animals offer. Therefore, it is only under certain circumstances that animals are permitted in the church buildings. Service animals fall into this exception. As well as during a special worship service that is for the blessing of animals. All other exceptions will require the approval of council and/or the Ministerial team.

TRUE OR FALSE? The United Church of Canada was formed in 1925 in part so the founding denominations – Methodist, Presbyterian, and Congregational – could combine their finances to do more mission work in Canada and around the world?

If you guessed true, you are right. From the very beginning, our United Church was formed out of a desire to come together and serve others like Jesus did. Through M & S, we have been helping to save and transform lives, inspire meaning and purpose, and build a better world for 96 years. Today we are as committed as ever.
